



The book of Numbers

• **In the Wilderness**

- This is the original name of the book
- And a very good description of it
- This is the only book about the wandering in the wilderness
- Stories you may know
 - 12 spies
 - Israel complains
 - Korah's rebellion
 - Balaam and the donkey
 - Bronze serpent
 - Moses hits the rock
- What there is little of
 - Numbers



Why Numbers is special



It's the turning point of the journey to Canaan

- It should have taken only a few weeks to travel (**Deut. 1:2**)
- Israel wandered 40 years due to their unbelief
- Moses failed at the end and also did not get to see Canaan

Main characters

-  **Moses**
-  **Aaron**
-  **Levites**
 - Priests' servants
-  **Balaam** →
-  **Korah**
-  **Joshua and Caleb**
 - The only *adult* survivors of the wilderness



Outline of Numbers

- Year 1 (plus a month): **chapters 1-10** Mt. Sinai
 - (First) census
 - Priestly laws and ceremonies
- Years 2-39: **chapters 11-20** Wilderness of Paran
 - 12 spies; Israel punished with 40 years of wandering
 - Miriam and Aaron oppose Moses
 - Korah and crew opposes Moses and Aaron
 - Moses hits the rock and forfeits chance to go to Canaan
- Year 40: **chapters 21-36** Plains of Moab
 - Bronze serpent (and plague of serpents)
 - Defeat of Og and Sihon (land east of the Jordan)
 - Balaam and Balak (and the donkey)
 - Second census
 - Plans for their new homeland

Where do those dates come from?

- **Numbers 9:1** marks “the first month of the second year after they had come out of the land of Egypt” (NASB)
- **Numbers 10:1** is not long after, “In the second year, in the second month, on the twentieth day of the month” (NASB)
- In **Numbers 20:28**, Aaron dies.
 - Why is that relevant?
 - **Numbers 33:38** specifies that Aaron died “in the fortieth year after the people of Israel had come out of the land of Egypt” (NASB)
- Put that together and it means chapters 10-20 cover at least 38 years

Theology and doctrine

- Christ is seen in the book of *Numbers*
 - **John 3:14**, “And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up”
 - **1 Corinthians 10:4**, “for they drank of that spiritual Rock that followed them: and that Rock was Christ.”
 - **Numbers 24:17**, “A star shall come forth from Jacob, A scepter shall rise from Israel”
 - (All quotes from KJV)
- Israel’s and Korah’s rebellions are remembered
 - **Psalm 95:7-11** reminds of Meribah and disobedience
 - **Hebrews 3:7-19** riffs on Psalm 95
 - **Jude 11** cites Balaam and Korah as warnings

Numbers 13-14




Summary

12 spies sent to Canaan

- God commands that 12 people from Israel to do recon in Canaan
 - Meaning: to spy out the land they are about to invade, and bring back a report of the geography, people and resources
- It's scary there
 - Joshua and Caleb believe God can lead them to victory
 - The other 10 do not, and convince the nation also. As a result...
- The whole nation must wander for 40 years and die in the desert
 - Only Joshua and Caleb will survive (and any kids)



Why this story is special



- It is the moment when Israel seals its fate
 - Hundreds of thousands of people will die on the way

Main characters

-  **Joshua and Caleb**
 - Two of the 12 spies
 - They trust in God to deliver everyone
-  **Ten other spies**
 - Think they are all going to die
-  **Israelites**
 - Think they are all going to die
-  **Moses**
 - Pleads to God to not kill everyone immediately

Outline

1. Spies chosen: one per tribe (**13:1-16**)
2. Moses gives instructions (**13:17-20**)
3. The spies go out and report back (**13:21-29**)
4. Caleb is confident, but his companions are afraid (**13:30-33**)
5. The nation gives up... on everything (**14:1-4**)
6. Joshua and Caleb plead with the nation and are almost killed for it (**14:5-10**)
7. The LORD is going to start over with a new nation (**14:11-12**)
8. Moses begs God not to (**14:13-19**)
9. God agrees but promises the punishment: 40 years of time in the wilderness and the adults will die before the end (**14:20-38**)
10. Israel “repents” by going into Canaan, against the command of Moses, and is defeated (**14:39-45**)

In case you missed it

- Joshua the spy is THAT Joshua
 - A book of the Bible is named after him
 - Led Israelite warriors to defeat Amalek (**Exodus 17**)
 - Went on the Mountain of God with Moses, and was not involved with golden calf (**Exodus 24:13-14**)
 - Was “the assistant of Moses from his youth” (**Numbers 11:28** ESV)
 - Chosen to replace Moses as leader of Israel (**Deuteronomy 3:28**)
- Joshua was originally named Hoshea
 - Moses changed his name (**Numbers 13:16**)

Theology and doctrine

- Was God really going to kill everyone – before Moses interceded?
 - Moses seems to have thought so (**Numbers 14:15**)
- Possibly it is a test, in the same way that Abraham was asked to kill Isaac
 - Why kill the son that God had promised as an heir?
 - But Abraham believed God could raise him from the dead (**Hebrews 11:19**)
- Similarly, if the nation was wiped out, it would also seem to violate certain prophecies
 - Like kings from Judah (**Genesis 49:10**)
- But God can always find a way (**Hebrews 7:13-14**)

Poem: Psalm 136

His Steadfast Love Endures Forever

- 26 times it says, “His steadfast love endures forever” (at the end of every verse!)
- Verses 16-22 relate to the book of Numbers
- Six sections:
 - Give thanks to God (vs. 1-3)
 - God created the world (vs. 4-9)
 - God delivered Israel out of Egypt (vs. 10-15)
 - God defeated kings in the wilderness (vs. 16-22)
 - God cares for the needy (vs. 23-25)
 - Give thanks to God (v. 26)
